

Maryland AP Option

- Number of Required AP Courses: 5
- · Specific Courses Required:

At least 2 courses in the same content area <u>AND</u> at least 2 content areas included

Course Content Areas:

English/Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Arts, Computer Sciences, World Languages

Score Requirement:

3 or higher on at least 3 AP exams <u>AND</u> a grade of C or higher in 5 AP courses

College Board & Accommodations

- If a student has testing accommodations via a 504 or an IEP plan, these accommodations do not apply to College Board assessments (PSAT, SAT, or AP exams).
- To request accommodations, parents need to complete a College Board consent form and submit the signed form to the Testing Coordinator, Ms. Cosgrove, who will submit the request.
- College Board has eight weeks to review before rendering a decision which will apply to all College Board assessments until the student graduates.
